1. General Information

This Import Information Note (IIN) must be read in conjunction with the IIN for general information for imports of products of animal origin (POAO), which provides information on pre-notifications, veterinary checks, risk categories etc.

References to European Union (EU) legislation within this document are references to direct EU Legislation which has been assimilated in Great Britain (assimilated direct

legislation), as defined in the Retained EU Law (Revocation and Reform) Act 2023 and can be viewed on the UK legislation website (legislation.gov.uk).

2. Scope

Import conditions for meat for human consumption derived from:

- farmed and wild Leporidae (rabbits)
- wild land mammals

3. Country of origin

Imports are permitted from trading partners listed in a document published by the Secretary of State, with the consent of the Scottish and Welsh Ministers. See the documents for meat of wild leporidae, of certain wild land mammals and of farmed rabbits at the links below.

Trading partners must have RM, WL or WM listed in columns 3, 5 or 7 of the above documents in order to be able to export meat of farmed and wild leporidae and wild land mammals to Great Britain, where:

- RM is for meat of farmed rabbits
- WL is for meat of wild leporidae (rabbits and hares)
- WM is for meat of wild land mammals other than ungulates and leporidae

Certain countries may be required to provide supplementary guarantees, depending on the animal health situation in the territories of origin. Please also check the 4th, 6th and 8th columns of the above documents, where these supplementary guarantees are listed.

In addition, the country of origin must be listed for the appropriate species in a document published by the Secretary of State, with the consent of the Scottish and Welsh Ministers, in accordance with Decision (EU) 2011/163 on the approval of residue monitoring plans submitted by third countries. The relevant documents are accessible using the links above.

4. Approved establishments

Meat must be produced in an establishment approved to export to Great Britain.

Consolidated lists of approved plants are available on data.gov.uk.

The above link does not include approved establishments in the EU. Until those are included please use the list found via this [link](#).

5. Health certification/documentation

Imports to Great Britain must be accompanied by the appropriate health certificate (*), which can be found on GOV.UK.

The health certificates are based on the requirements included in Regulation (EC) 119/2009.

(*) Please note that this requirement will be introduced for animal products from EU and EFTA countries in the high and medium risk categories from 31st January 2024. Further information regarding risk categories can be found at the link below.

6. Health and identification marks

Meat referred to above must bear a health or identification mark as appropriate in accordance with the requirements of Article 48 of [Regulation \(EU\) 2019/627](#). The mark must be applied before the product leaves the establishment. Establishments must comply with the specific rules on the hygiene of food of animal origin requirements of Regulation (EC) 853/2004 in the application of identification marks.
