IMPORTS OF HONEY FROM THIRD COUNTRIES - SPECIES OF BEE

Purpose

1. To inform OVSs that imported honey from a third country to the UK may only originate from the bee species *Apis mellifera*.

Background

- 2. On the 14th December 2019, the Official Controls Regulation (OCR) introduced a new certificate for imported honey in Regulation (EU) 2019/628.
 - In Article 2 of that Regulation "honey" is defined in point 1 of Part IX of Annex II
 to Regulation (EU) No 1308/2013: "Honey shall be understood as honey within
 the meaning of Council Directive 2001/110/EC including as regards to the main
 types of honey."
 - Annex I, point 1 of Council Directive 2001/110/EC defines honey as: "Honey is
 the natural sweet substance produced by Apis mellifera bees from the nectar of
 plants or from secretions of living parts of plants or excretions of plant-sucking
 insects on the living parts of plants, which the bees collect, transform by





combining with specific substances of their own, deposit, dehydrate, store and leave in honeycombs to ripen and mature."

3. TRACES only provides one option in Part I of the Common Veterinary Entry Document/Common Health Entry Document (CVED/CHED) regarding the species of bee for honey imports. We recommend that OVSs check the bee species entered in the Export Health Certificate (EHC) to ensure it is declared as Apis mellifera even if reported as such in the CVED/CHED Part I. If any species other than Apis mellifera are entered in the EHC, the consignment cannot enter the UK or EU as it does not meet the legal definition of honey and therefore the honey marketing rules.
